This catalogue is of material held at Dorset Gardens Methodist Church on behalf of the whole Circuit.

1. Mick Hickman (MH) is the current Circuit Archivist. J. Antony (Tony) Funnell (JAF) was Archivist for the old Brighton & Hove Circuit. After merger with the Brighton (Dome Mission) Circuit in 1997. MH and JAF were joint Archivists until JAF's death.
2. J. L. (Len) Wright was MH's predecessor as Archivist of the Brighton (Dome Mission) Circuit.
3. The Wesleyan Methodists (WM) had several Churches in the area. Both Dorset Gardens and Hove were founded as WM Churches.
4. The Bible Christians (BC) had three Churches in the area, Stanford Avenue was founded as a BC Church. The United Methodist Free Church (UMFC) had a Church briefly in mid-19th century in Brighton. The BC, Methodist New Connexion (MNC) and UMFC united in 1907 to form the United Methodist Church (UMC). The MNC never had a society in Brighton and Hove, or in Sussex.
5. The Primitive Methodists (PM) had many Churches in the area, the last was London Road Methodist Church.
6. The PM, the UMC, and the WM united in 1932 to form the Methodist Church. In Brighton and Hove this was a relatively easy process but Dorset Gardens WM, which ran the Dome Mission, became its own Brighton (Dome Mission) Circuit. All PM, UMC and the other WM churches joined to become the Brighton and Hove Circuit. The two circuits merged in 1997 to form the current Brighton and Hove Circuit.
